LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

DePOT's 2023 Summer Institute, Project Assembly, and Conference will take place in Mi'kma'ki, the ancestral and unceded territory of the Mi'kmaq People.

This territory is covered by the Treaties of Peace and Friendship which Mi'kmaq and Wolastoqiyik (Maliseet) People first signed with the British Crown in 1725.

The treaties did not deal with surrender of lands and resources; they recognized Mi'kmaq and Wolastoqiyik title and established the rules for what was to be an ongoing relationship between nations.

1. Eltuek Arts Centre

170 George Street, Sydney, Nova Scotia

Eltuek Arts Centre is a renovated convent that has served as an arts center and creativity hub since 2020. Both hotels are in Sydney's waterfront district and within walking-distance from many restaurants and attractions—including the Joan Harriss Cruise Pavilion, where you can find the "Big Fiddle," the Cape Breton Exhibition Centre, and other shops. Both hotels are a 20-minute drive from the airport. While there is a bus into Sydney (route 1), there is a thirty-minute walk involved to reach the bus stop.

Flights

Sydney's airport ([JA Douglas McCurdy Sydney Airport, YQY](#)) is a regional airport. Travellers from outside of Canada will need to take a flight to Montreal, Toronto, or Halifax before connecting to Sydney. Please note that **SYD** is Sydney, Australia's international airport.

[Nova Scotia's tourism authority](#) has some recommendations for international travelers, but Air Canada is the only airline that currently services Sydney.

Driving and Bus Transportation

Sydney is a 5–6-hour drive from Halifax (Nova Scotia's provincial capital). There are no rail options to travel to Sydney.

Maritime Bus runs a daily bus service from the Halifax Airport to Sydney (the downtown Sydney stop is called Hippy Hemp). Currently, the bus is scheduled to leave Halifax Airport at 3:50 PM and arrive in Sydney at 9:35 PM. Car rental services are available at both the Sydney and Halifax airports. You need to be 21+ to rent a car in Canada, and may have to pay a young driver's fee if you are under 25 years old. If your driver's license is not in English or French, check in with the rental company to make sure that they will accept your license.

Public Transportation

Using public transit, it takes about 30 minutes to get from downtown Sydney to Cape Breton University using one of two bus routes: the #14 is the CBU Express (which goes directly to CBU) while the #1 bus route goes from Sydney to Glace Bay with a stop at Cape Breton University. The bus stop closest to the conference hotels is George/Pitts, at the intersection of George Street and Pitt Street, shown on the map below. Please note that the Monday-Friday and Saturday service schedules differ; see the table below for a summary of timetables.



Student and adult tickets cost \$1.25 per zone, and \$1.00 per extra zone. Getting from Sydney to Cape Breton University requires traveling in two zones and costs \$2.25. Transit resources:

FUNDING POLICY

For faculty members & project partners, travel funding will be paid out as reimbursements for direct expenditures after the Annual Meetings.

Please be sure to keep receipts for flights, taxis, hotels, and meals in addition to your boarding passes (digital or printed) so that we can process your refund through Concordia University.

COVID POLICY

At the time of planning, COVID-19 policy in Canada is relaxed. Cape Breton University, our host institution, also does not have any COVID-related mandates in place.

In case the COVID rules will be more restrictive by June 2023, it will be useful for participants to have proof of their vaccination status, not just to travel to Canada but also in case of potential changes to the respective policies of our host locations.
